Carl Sadakichi Hartmann (1867-1944) was born in Nagasaki to a Japanese mother, Osada Hartmann (d. 1868) who died soon after childbirth and a German father, Carl Herman Oskar Hartmann (1840-1929). Sadakichi was raised in Germany until he was fourteen years old. After an incident in which his father forced him to join the naval academy, he subsequently ran away and was then sent to live with relatives in America in 1882.

Three years of his adolescence were spent living in Philadelphia with his great-uncle and aunt. It was during this period that Hartmann would take advantage of the cultural institutions the city had to offer, which contributed to his passion for art and creativity. His time spent at the Library Company of Philadelphia becoming self-taught in their reading room would engender him to donate many of his manuscripts to the institution for preservation.

Hartmann was married twice and had sixteen children. His first marriage was in 1890 at age twentythree to Elizabeth Blanche Walsh (1868-1950). At forty-one, Hartmann married Lillian R. Bonham (1883-1939). In 1894, he became a naturalized U.S. citizen.

A writer, poet, dramatist, critic, and occasional performer during the 20th century, Hartmann was a notable figure in early modernism. He was one of the first critics to explore photography as an art form. Hartmann also published about photography under the pseudonym Sidney Allan, which outnumbered those under his real name. His social circle was diverse and included several notables such as Walt Whitman, John Barrymore, Stéphane Mallarmé, and Ezra Pound.

Not affiliated with any one religion, but rather interest in the philosophies of numerous religions and their central figures, many of his plays revolved around historic religious subjects, such as Jesus Christ, Confucius, Mohammed, Buddha, and founder of Christian Science, Mary Baker Eddy (also a friend of Sadakichi). Hartmann attributed the fascination of different religious philosophies to his extended family's varied practices.

Hartmann moved west to California around 1916. In 1942, Hartmann was living on his daughter Wistaria's ranch outside Banning, California. Due to his age and declining health, he was able to avoid imprisonment during the World War II mass incarcerations taking place in the United States against people of Japanese descent. In 1944, while visiting his daughter Dorothea in Florida, Hartmann passed away.

Scope and Content Note

This collection contains manuscripts, poetry, and correspondence from Sadakichi Hartmann that he donated to the Library Company of Philadelphia over the course of his life. The materials in the collection span from 1887 to 1942.
